From the Rector

Intelligent Design...

I find myself in a quandary lately. Many people have approached me to ask for my thoughts on the trial underway in Dover, PA about whether or not Intelligent Design should be taught in public schools as an alternative to the Theory of Evolution.

I'm happy to answer the question, but warn folks that the answer is going to take about an hour or more to share. These are complicated questions that frankly have little to do with the scientific method and much more to do with questions of Philosophy.

I'm not a biologist. As such I really don't feel qualified to make any comments on the present state of evolutionary theory. I do know that the modern model of how natural selection works is different and more sophisticated than what I was taught when I studied biology in 10th grade.

I do have some familiarity, though, with modern Cosmology. There are issues in Cosmology that have some connection with the question of Intelligent Design. Specifically the issue in Cosmology is whether or not the Universe that we see today has arisen from random chance or if it has arisen because of a pre-ordained design. The issue described is called the Anthropic Principle. In simplest terms, it states that "because we are here to observe the Universe, the Universe must have been 'tuned' so that our existence was fore-ordained". (There are versions of the Anthropic Principle which would relax the "fore-ordained" language.)

As of now, there is no way to test the Anthropic Principle and decide whether it is right or wrong. (This is the case because at the moment we don't understand what the predictions of Quantum Mechanics mean.) Since there is no way to test the idea, the idea itself is not really something that scientists study, it's more a thing that scientists either believe or reject. Intelligent design appears to me to be similar to the Anthropic Principle in that you either believe it or not. It's a philosophical issue not really a scientific one.

The larger problem comes, however, when people try to use Intelligent Design to support an argument that says that Evolution is wrong. As it is presently understood, evolution is a scientific theory that is testable and which has a large body of evidence supporting it. There is apparently evidence that does not support it, but that doesn't mean Evolution is wrong, it means the theory is incomplete. If someone is going to replace the theory entirely, the new model must predict more accurately all things which the Theory of Evolution already predicts, and then go further and predict accurately things which Evolution has not been able to explain. Intelligent Design has

Looking through the Eyes of the Saints

Reflections for Children's Sunday, 10/30/05

Micah 3:5-12

1 Thessalonians 2:9-13, 17-20

Matthew 23:1-12

In the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Does anybody know what holiday is coming up this week? That's right! I think that it's my favorite holiday, because I'm named after it. Laura Howell...Howell-o-ween... but that's just a joke.

Who knows what Hallowe'en really is? Hallow is an old fashioned word that means holy. You all know the Lord's Prayer, right? It starts like this: "Our Father, who art in Heaven, hallowed by thy name." That means, "Lord, let your name be holy." Hallowe'en isn't the only holiday this week. In the church, we will be celebrating the holidays of All Saints and All Souls. In olden days, we used to call the holiday All Hallows—because saints are holy. And Hallowe'en means the eve—the night before--All Hallows. Just like Christmas Eve is the night before Christmas.

So what's really important about Hallowe'en is that it's the night before one of the best days in the church year! When we think about all the saints and holy people who have lived and died for hundreds and thousands of years.

What do we like to do on Hallowe'en? Go trick-or-treating. Eat candy. Dress up. What costumes are you going to wear this year? And what do we do with our faces? We put on masks, or we paint them to look like somebody else.

When you put on a mask, what happens to you? When I put on my lion mask, I want to roar and be fierce. When I put on my bull mask, I feel big and strong. When I put on my eagle mask, I feel like I can fly high, all the way to the sun. I pretend to be somebody else. Then, I take off the mask and I'm just plain me.

When I was little, people used to ask me, "What do you want to be when you grow up?" I used to want to be a priest, because I really liked and respected the priests I knew. And now I am. Mrs. Knisely wanted to be a neurologist, a kind of doctor that studies the body's nervous system, because she knew that doctors help sick people get better. Now she works with an ambulance to help people when they have car accidents. Mr. Howell wanted to be a psychologist. Now he interviews people and writes about their stories. Some people want to be firemen, and drive big

trucks and save people and pets from burning buildings.

One reason we have saints in the church is that they are our superheroes. They are the people we want to grow up to be like. We like to tell the stories of their lives, and hear about how they were faithful and loyal to Jesus. And we like to hear about their amazing adventures. Every Wednesday morning, some of us get together to hear those stories. Today, I'm thinking about four saints that we know really well, because we read their books all the time—every Sunday. St. Matthew, St. Mark, St. Luke, St. John—the holy people who wrote the Gospels.

Each of them has a creature that represents them—kind of like a picture of who they are: St. Matthew's creature is a person; St. Mark's is a lion; St. Luke's is a bull; St. John's is an eagle. And all four of them are painted on

the stand for the paschal candle. Marius Bressoud and his daughter painted them. Each one of you short people has a mask with one of the creatures on them. Put your masks on now if you don't already have them on.

Lions—you are St. Mark, because you wrote about the resurrection of Jesus. Bulls—you are St. Luke, because you wrote about how Jesus gave his life for us. Eagles—you are St. John, because you wrote about Jesus as Light. And when you take your masks off, you will be people again—so then you will be St. Matthew, who wrote about how Jesus was human, like we are.

If you could put on a mask and become Jesus' very good friends, like Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, what would you be like? If we were ALL being friends of Jesus, what would the world be like? The holidays of All Saints and All Souls remind

us how important the saints are in our spiritual lives. We can put on our saint mask, look through the eyes and see the world in a different way.

We can see the world through the eyes of Mary, who was Jesus' mother. Can you imagine what it was like to have to take care of Jesus when he was a little kid? We can see the world through the eyes of St. Hildegard, who wrote such beautiful music a thousand years ago that people still play it today. Or St. Francis who loved and took care of all the animals.

What saint is your hero? Which saint do you want to grow up to be like? I want to be like St. Seraphim, who was so peaceful that even the dangerous wild Russian bears liked to sit down and have supper with him.

Some of us here are adults—at least enough years have passed since we were born to make us adults. But that doesn't mean that we are all grown up spiritually. As we enter the octave—the 8-day celebration of All Saints—I invite you all to choose one or more saints—put on your saint mask and try looking through the eyes of the saints. Amen.

Consecration Sunday Is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay the bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's *mission and ministry with a percentage of their income*.

Trinity's Vestry and Finance Committee have selected the *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like the followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. *New Consecration Sunday* encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?" During the Eucharist on Consecration Sunday we will be asking our parishioners to make their financial commitment to our parish's ministry and mission in this community and beyond.

Everyone who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* will do so voluntarily by attending one of the Eucharists that weekend. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will not do any home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During the Eucharist our Guest Leader (The Rev. Canon Calvin C. Adams) will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by parishioners making their commitment as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday Team and Vestry members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend the Eucharist that weekend.

Thank you in advance for your enthusiastic participation in Consecration Sunday events, and please remember our Parish and our ministry in your prayers in the weeks ahead.

not done this yet. And until it does, Intelligent Design is going to have a hard time being taken seriously by the scientific establishment.

But... My quandary comes from the fact that I do believe that the Universe was created and designed with a purpose. I have no philosophical problems at all with Intelligent Design. I just can't prove that it's true. I understand that my belief is not scientific. But that's okay. Science is limited in what it can do and in what it can ultimately discuss. There are matters that belong properly to the realms of Philosophy and Theology. Maybe we need to stop trying to teach Intelligent Design in Biology Class and start pushing for educators to include it in the Philosophy Course instead.

At any rate, I have found that there is nothing in my scientific training that asks or requires me to disavow the first line of our Christian Creed: "I believe in God, the Father Almighty, Creator of Heaven and Earth." It says believe, not "can prove". There's probably a very deep spiritual teaching in that choice of words.
