From the Rector

Dear People of Trinity Church, Bethlehem;

I never quite know what to say when the moment comes to say goodbye to a parish that I have served as a priest. This is the third time that I have done this in my ministry and each time it gets harder.

As I said in worship this past weekend, part of being effective in ministry is learning to recognize what gifts God has given you and then working to be a good steward of them. I have come to believe that my primary gift in ministry is empowering congregations to transform themselves into the people they believe that God is calling them to be. I was called to Trinity parish eight years ago this fall to help this congregation grow in numbers and new forms of ministry. Over the years I believe this has happened, and I am honored to have played whatever role I had to play in this work. I am leaving in large part because I have heard God in my prayers calling me to use these same gifts in another place. Trinity is a healthy and vital parish where the Gospel of Jesus is preached and important ministry is being performed. I have done what I was called here to do, and it seems that God is calling me to do the same sort of ministry in a new field.

And yet moving on doesn't come without sorrow and sadness. I have so many wonderful memories of these past eight years and I shall miss you all desperately. I still remember driving up the parish on my first day, looking at the building and realizing that I was going to share in the responsibility in making sure that it was kept in good repair. I remember getting into the pulpit on my first Sunday. (I also remember when we sent the pulpit out for cleaning and forgot to write down how to put it back together again. Remember the weeks it sat in pieces on the floor while we tried to get it set up again. In the end it took an rocket scientist, a radiologist and an astrophysicist to put it right - with only a few left over parts...)

My favorite memories are of the "family" moments that have been a part of our journey together. The baptisms full of pride and excitement. The confirmation services that marked the beginning of adulthood for so many in the congregation. I remember the weddings and the joy of families as they came together and became one. I remember the tears at so many funerals and the sorrow as we marked the loss of friends. And I remember the four (four!) ordinations that have been a part of our lives together these past eight years. And of course the moments week in and week out as

On Tour with Jack Vickrey

Would you like to visit a place you've heard of, but probably never before actually gone to? How about Hell? Jack Vickrey will escort a group of tourists through Dante's *Inferno*, as translated by Dorothy Sayers. The group will be traveling on Wednesday evenings (Oct. 4, 11, 18, 25), from 6:00 - 7:30.

We will go with Dante as he awakes to find himself in a dark wood, meets his ghost-guide, the poet Virgil, and goes with Virgil down, down, down--through Hell Gate and Upper Hell (Francesca da Rimini, the curiously unrecognizable Hoarders and Spendthrifts, the Wrathful, and others), into Nether Hell (the Circles of the Violent and then [depths below depths] the circles of Simple and Complex Fraud, with their wretched sinners and dire afflictions--Ulysses and Guido and Ugolino and all, but we can add our own ["I've got a little list"])--and finally Satan himself, the great prince-prisoner of Hell. Then, out, "to look once more upon the stars."

There are in the *Inferno* spectacles aplenty to behold. But as tourists we will try also to grasp the order and system of "the City of Desolation" (it is a Model community, efficiently managed, where the punishment always fits the crime) and to grasp some idea of Dante's vision of how a just world would be ordered.

We are using Dorothy Sayers' translation of *Inferno* specifically for its excellent notes. Copies of the book are available from Mo. Laura at \$10.00.

CARNIVAL TIME – LAW AND ORGIES

A November Forum Series with Howard Fegan

The first five books of the Bible are known as the books of the law. In fact they contain a mixture of stories, cast in the form of historical narrative, and passages of law. The stories are among the best known and most read parts of the Hebrew scriptures while the law passages are among the least known and read. Based on the book Conversations with Scripture: the Law by Kevin A Wilson (Anglican Association of Biblical Scholars Series), we shall spend some time thinking about these neglected passages.

In a society made up mostly of poor people living in small villages there are few opportunities to commit crime. There is little worth stealing, and every one knows every one else's business so the chance of escaping detection is small. The result is that only a small part of the law concerns matters that we would regard as criminal. Far more is concerned with ritual, such as sacrifice, and social behaviour, such as rules for sex.

Appearances are deceiving when it comes to sacrifices. In our modern usage of the word if we make a sacrifice then we expect to suffer as a result. Now the suffering is intended to be outweighed by some benefit, but we still expect suffering to be involved. In ancient Israel many times the animal sacrifice was a means of slaughtering the animal for food. This did not happen often – meat was too expensive to eat except on special occasions. However, when meat was eaten it was feast time. After all the word carnival has the same root as carnivorous.

The surprise with the social law is how much it breaks with the practice of the neighboring people. Ancestor worship, divination and belief in demons are all out. Setting up altars in the form of standing stones, and especially so on high places, is banned. This last one is awkward since Jacob is remembered favorably for doing just this at Bethel. It looks like an attempt to establish a new form of religious practice; an attempt that was largely but not entirely successful. By the time of Jesus the people clearly believed in demons. Further in the parts referring to sexual behavior there appear to be echoes of an earlier fertility cult, so the break is not entirely complete.

The purpose of this new way seems to be to preserve the identity of the people of Israel. In modern terms this policy is a form of racial purity. The dietary laws and the ban on mixed yarn fabrics are intended to symbolize this separation. While this was a good idea two and a half millennia ago, in our world it leads to much trouble. In this series of

Sunday forums we shall be working on these ideas and eventually asking the question of what we make of it today.

GODLY PLAY

This fall, Ellyn Siftar, our new Director of Religious Education, will be introducing a new program for our children. The Center for the Theology of Childhood describes it in this way: "*Godly Play* is a method of Christian education and spiritual direction primarily for children aged 2- 12. The goal of Godly Play is to teach children the art of using religious language, parable, sacred story, silence, and liturgical action to help them become more fully aware of the mystery of God's presence around them and in their lives."

Developed by Episcopal priest Dr. Jerome Berryman in 1972, *Godly Play* is used all over the world. Look for more from Ellyn in the next newsletter. She and at least one of the teachers will be attending a *Godly Play* training conference in Baltimore during the middle of September.

Ellyn will also be revealing more detailed plans for the teens' Christian Education program, which she says will involve helping with *Godly Play*, and doing some drama.

Christian Education for the Children begins on September 24.

GOING DEEPER

The Going Deeper group invites you to join us 6:00-7:30 in the Chapel on the first and third Mondays of the month (excepting holidays).
