

CONFESSION OF SIN

Celebrant

If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. But if we confess our sins, God, who is faithful and just, will forgive our sins and cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

Let us confess our sins to God.

Most merciful God,
we confess that we have sinned against you
in thought, word, and deed,
by what we have done,
and by what we have left undone.
We have not loved you with our whole heart;
we have not loved our neighbors as ourselves.
We are truly sorry and we humbly repent.
For the sake of your Son Jesus Christ,
have mercy on us and forgive us;
that we may delight in your will,
and walk in your ways,
to the glory of your Name. Amen.

FIRST READING

Jeremiah 31:31-34

The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and the house of Judah. It will not be like the covenant that I made with their ancestors when I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt—a covenant that they broke, though I was their husband, says the LORD. But this is the covenant that I will make with the house of Israel after those days, says the LORD: I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people. No longer shall they teach one another, or say to each other, "Know the LORD," for they shall all know me, from the least of them to the greatest, says the LORD; for I will forgive their iniquity, and remember their sin no more.


SECOND READING Hebrews 5:5-10

Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him,

"You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place,

> "You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek."

In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.



THE GOSPEL John 12:20-33

Now among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. They came to Philip, who was from Bethsaida in Galilee, and said to him, "Sir, we wish to see Jesus." Philip went and told Andrew; then Andrew and Philip went and told Jesus. Jesus answered them, "The hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit. Those who love their life lose it, and those who hate their life in this world will keep it for eternal life. Whoever serves

me must follow me, and where I am, there will my servant be also. Whoever serves me, the Father will honor.

"Now my soul is troubled. And what should I say—'Father, save me from this hour'? No, it is for this reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name." Then a voice came from heaven, "I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again." The crowd standing there heard it and said that it was thunder. Others said, "An angel has spoken to him." Jesus answered, "This voice has come for your sake, not for mine. Now is the judgment of this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He said this to indicate the kind of death he was to die.

SERMON

NICENE CREED

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen. We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father. 





The Return of the Chalice

A Mystery Resolved By Fr. Cliff Carr

Trinity's parish archives speak of the mysterious disappearance of a large silver chalice in 1927. The chalice was given in memory of **Edward Coppeé Mitchell** (1836-1887) by his wife and children sometime after his death.

Edward Coppeé Mitchell was born in Savannah, Georgia and practiced law in Philadelphia. His mother died shortly after his birth, and when his father remarried, Edward came north to live with



his mother's sister Althea Coppeé, whose husband The Rev. William B. Stevens subsequently became the Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania. Not only was Bishop Stevens his uncle, but he became his father-in-law in 1867 when Edward married his cousin Eliza Coppeé Stevens. They were the parents of six children.

Sometime in the 1880s the family purchased a "summer home" at 139 Church Street in Bethlehem to escape from the heat of Philadelphia. Also living in Bethelehem was his uncle Henry Coppeé who served as the first President of Lehigh University from 1866-1875, and as a faculty member until his death in 1895.

Following Edward's death in 1887, Eliza and her children made Bethlehem their permanent home and became members of Trinity Church. Two of their daughters were married at Trinity, and Eliza and some of her children are buried in the Nisky Hill Cemetery near their home.

In addition to the chalice, a paten and large flagon for wine were also given in Edward's memory by the family. After Eliza's death in 1907 a credence table was given in her memory by her children. The flagon alone survives, but is no longer in use (now in storage). When the chancel was



enlarged in 1926-27, that credence table was moved to its present location at the right of the high altar. It would seem that it was within that time-frame that the chalice disappeared.

Lei Barry, who lives in the Philadelphia area, had purchased the chalice from an antique dealer many years ago. Now in the process of downsizing, Lei recently contacted Trinity to see if she could return it to us. Trinity's archivist, Sara Klingner, worked with Lei to arrange an appropriate time for us to welcome the chalice back, and to celebrate God's providential care for both the chalice and for our worshiping community. We are thankful for its return, and glad to welcome Lei Barry to worship with us today!


